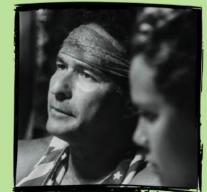

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

I knew once I finished *Little Feet*, I wanted to make more films about kids before they enter the adult world. A child's personal relationship to memory and how events unfold fascinate me. In this new chapter, the kids emerge from the shadows of their childhood to collide with the regiment of the adult world. They are no longer under the radar. And the adults around them are either incapable of taking care of them or forcing them into situations they should not be in. As a result, they run away and escape into a world of poetry, friendship, and freedom that come naturally to them.

This is a very personal film, my children, my wife, and my dear friend Will Patton came together to make it. We filmed with a hybrid between fiction and reality with a combination of trained actors and non-professionals. Due to the experimental nature of the film and the inventiveness, I wanted to shoot in 16mm film stock in order to bring a raw black-and-white, giving it a timeless feeling. Although this story takes place out of time, it is very real and contemporary. The insecurity, poetry,

and invention of these kids are mirrored by the film style. There is nothing conformist about the way we approached the filming. At the same time, it is very classic in style.

I know that Sweet Thing was a film I had to make and I hope it resonates with its audience and that the viewer experiences the same joy we had in the making of it.
